Beach School

The children in Reception have enjoyed starting Beach School again. Photography has been of interest within the Atelier, this month. Children have used cameras to take images and discuss what they could see. As their investigations developed, children started to use string and wool to stick structures, which evolved into the string game.

Studio

Identities have been a focal point with the children within the studio. Children have used mirrors to study their faces and paint a self-portrait to represent themselves with acrylic paints and canvas boards.

Snug

Children have continued their interest into performance and role-play in the snug. Children have been expressing themselves through dance and movement, whilst acting out experiences within their created 'hair salon'.

The snug has had some recent additions thank you to a kind family volunteer- thank you so much!

Garden

In the 'Garden' children have been using leaves as a stimulus for observational drawings and paintings. As adults, when we observe children through the master of drawing, we are able to get an insight to their understanding of their communication and their thinking. Every stroke and mark creates an understanding of the child's theories, perceptions and knowledge.
