Dear Parents and Carers,

We are nearly at the end of another academic year, and again I can't believe just what this year has brought us. The world of education has continued to evolve and respond to the impact of the pandemic, with bubble closures, testing and the introduction of new and improved remote learning styles.

At Benedict Biscop, we have been very fortunate that none of our pupils and staff have become seriously ill, we have had very few bubbles impacted by closures and we hope and pray that this continues to be the case as we move forward. We are saddened by the huge losses across the world and in our neighbouring communities and we hope that as the vaccine programme continues to be rolled out, that we will eventually see an end to the need to socially distance.

Unfortunately, we do not know yet what restrictions will look like in September for schools and we are awaiting updated guidance. We are therefore planning to keep arrangements as they are for the start of the next academic year. If guidance enables us to make changes to provision such as staggered start times, we will aim to provide updates to families in a timely fashion, with sufficient notice for changes. We will continue to update the coronavirus information section of our website [under the parents menu tab] and will email parents with any updated requirements.

The school itself has also been through a transformation this year, with the extension of our Early Year's provision and 3 new classrooms. The programme of works is due to be completed within the Summer holidays and we are looking forward to our increased numbers in September for our Reception and Nursery cohorts.

Despite a challenging year, with restrictions and reduced space, we could not be prouder of all our pupils' achievements this year. Our pupils and staff have all worked really hard to accelerate progress across the curriculum in an aim to counteract the impact of lockdowns, isolations and bubble closures. We are pleased that our recovery curriculum has been effective and the standards in school remain high across the curriculum. Our pupils have adapted remarkably well to remote education and we again thank parents, carers and family members for their continued support with the delivery and encouragement to participate in remote learning.

Our Rights Knights have continued to lead our pupil voice across the curriculum, working on improving our Anti-bullying provision and helping to educate pupils on healthy eating. They were recently successful in achieving the Platinum Anti-Bullying Award for the second time.

This term, we have been overjoyed that once again we were able to start after school club provision and that pupils have once again began to participate in educational visits and trips. Whilst these may have been slightly adapted to ensure safety within the pandemic, we see it as a positive step forward to returning to the experiential curriculum that we have always offered.

We are saddened that we will soon say goodbye to a fantastic year 6, who have shown that they can adapt to whatever is given to them and have demonstrated amazing outcomes. In the last few weeks it has been a joy to hear singing again in school and we are looking forward to their leavers presentation for their families via MS TEAMS.

I would like to say a huge thank you to all of the staff and the staff of the Trust. I am so lucky to work with such an exceptional team, who continue to work together to support our pupils and families. Everyone has worked tirelessly, working from home, working onsite in rotas and continuing to educate pupils in school whilst also trying to accelerate progress in areas impacted during lockdowns. I would also like to thank the school governors and directors of the Trust, who give up their time voluntarily to support us and have been instrumental in enabling the school to open safely for our pupils.

I hope that in the next few months restrictions will continue to lift and that once again school life will resume as we once knew it, with children mixing across year groups, parents on site and families joining us for events and community worship. I hope that all our families remain safe in the coming months. So once again, take care and thank you for your hugely positive support... we really appreciate it.

Nursery Spaces for September 2021

Due to the extension of our outstanding Early Years provision, we still have limited spaces available for children born between 01.09.2017 to 31.08.2018 to start our Nursery in September 2021. We offer 15 hours and 30 hours childcare.

Please note nursery is an admissions criteria so these children who attend our nursery are given higher priority to attend the school than those who don't (places cannot be guaranteed and applications are to be made through the Local Authority in Autumn term).

Year 2

In Science we continued our research about the scientist Rachel Carson. A part of her research identified that there were some problems in the ocean. She noticed that the water of the ocean had

chemicals in it, and that the animals that lived in the ocean also had chemicals in their bodies. We decided to prove how this

happened. First of all, we set up a small world in a tray, we then sprayed some rain on to our world and collected water samples. We then sprinkled different coloured sprinkles on to



the world (pesticides and fertilizer) and sprayed more rain on the world. We then collected more samples and could see the damage these chemicals had caused.

Year 6

Year 6 have been taking part in Children Challenging Industry with our partner company Alpek. We have been learning about all of the different plastics that there are, the similarities and differences and how to test the type of plastic that it is. We also




learnt about the different roles that we could aspire to if we wanted to go into industry in the future.






YEAR 5

Free School Meals

School can continue to provide school meal support for children who are eligible and are registered for free school meals. This can be a valuable support for families and is also available during the half term school holiday. To be eligible you must be in receipt of one of the benefits listed below:



- Income Support
- Income-Based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under part VI of the immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Child Tax Credit, provided they are not entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual income, as assessed by the Inland Revenue that does not exceed £16,190 or Guarantee element of Pension Credit
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit

By registering, the school will receive extra funding to support your child's education should you be entitled.

Transition

As part of Year 5's transition to Year 6 they investigated how Alnwick had changed over the years. To do this we used Digimap and applied our GIS skills to investigate historical and modern maps. Everyone recreated a map of Alnwick from World War 2, used this as a layer over a modern



baseline and made predictions to why things had changed since the 1940's.

RIGHTS KNIGHTS PACKED LUNCH POLICY REVIEW

WHY?

Because.... as part of feedback from parental questionnaires it was noted that 96% of parents agreed "that the school encouraged their child to eat and drink healthily"- this was down from previous years!

Because...Article 24 of the united Nations conference for the Rights of the child states that Children have the right to the best health care possible, clean water to drink, healthy food and a clean and safe environment to live in. All adults and children should have information about how to stay safe and healthy.

Because... Article 27 states that children have the right to food, clothing and a safe place to live so they can develop in the best possible way.

Because... WE WANT TO BE AS HEALTHY AS POSSIBLE.

We thought that by looking at the policy around packed lunches and speaking to children and we could try to promote healthy eating and balanced diets a lot more.

What we found out?

Nearly 10% of children shared they did not have any fruit of vegetables in their packed lunch on a daily basis.

Around 51% of children said they did not or only sometimes have a daily source of protein. Around 61% of children shared they sometimes or always had crisps in their lunch- as part of our policy this is not recommended.

Nearly half of the children we survey said they often brought sweets or chocolate items in their lunch – another thing that is not recommended.

Over 90% of children shared they either have water/ fresh fruit juice or a healthy smoothie to drink. This is very pleasing and we think this is because we are encouraged to drink water throughout the day in school – brining in water bottles and have cool water from the fountains.

What we did?
