

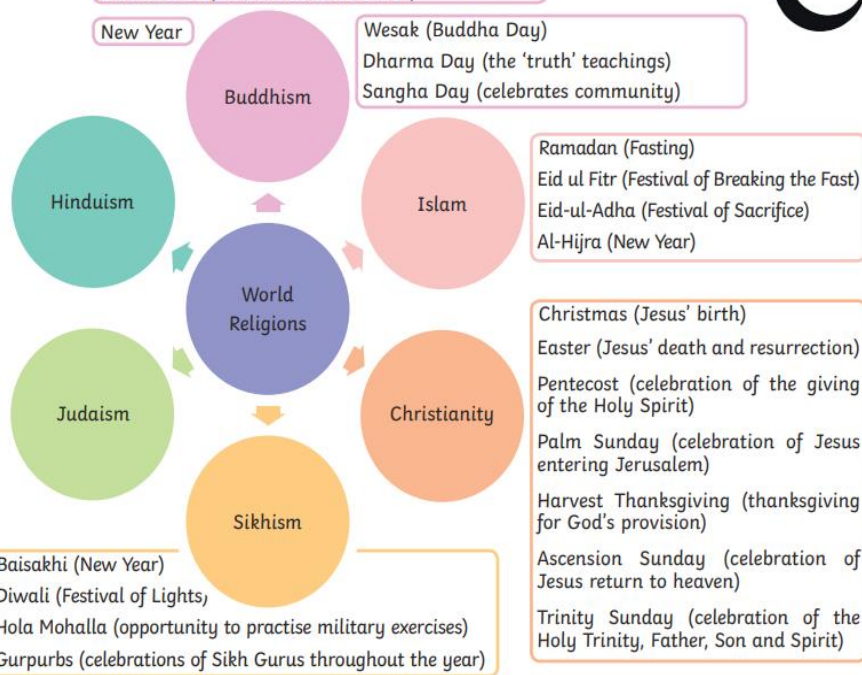
Diwali (Festival of Lights)

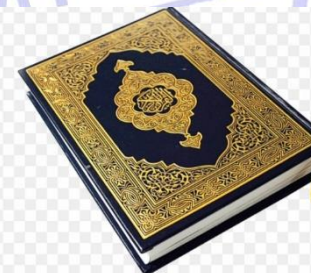
Wesak (Buddha Day)

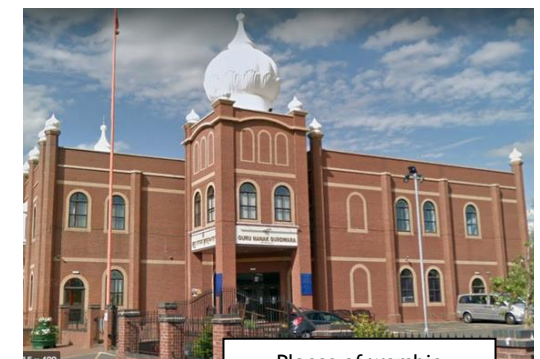

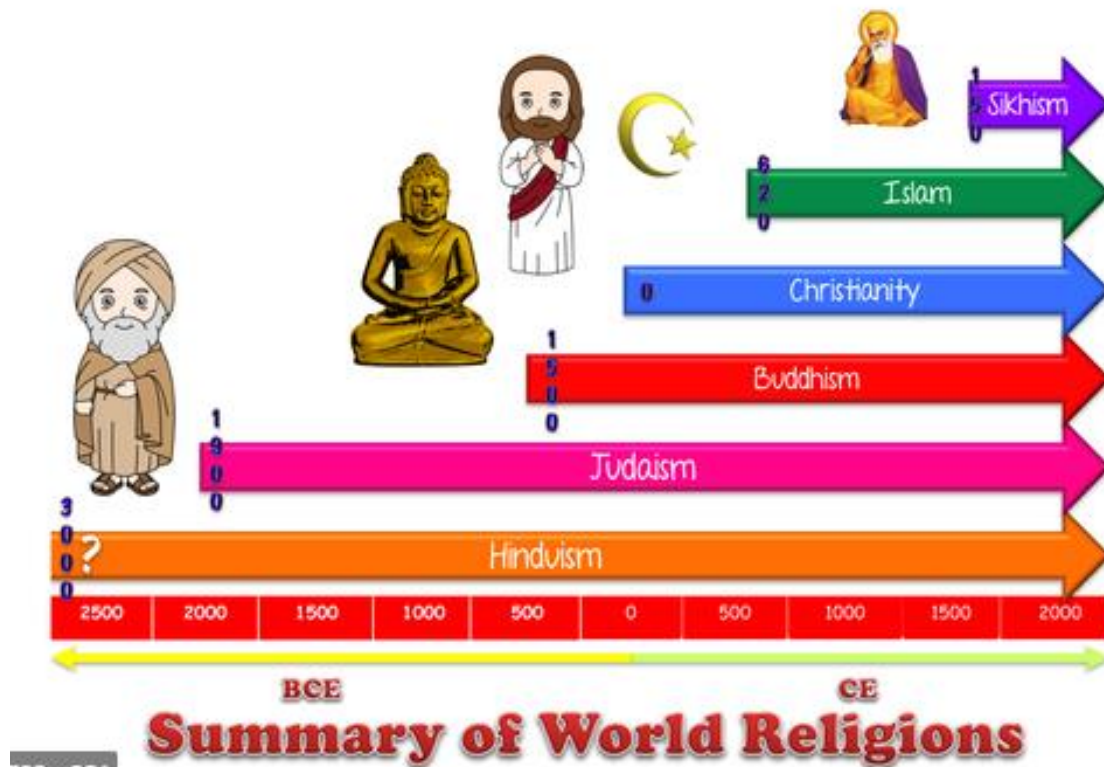
