WORMS!

The children have loved exploring the outdoor provision and today, a group of children were looking for and collecting worms to add to our new wormery. I sat down next to the children and almost immediately, they engaged me into a conversation, sharing their worm facts and asking questions.

“Do you know worms don’t have bones?”

“Is that why they’re so wiggly?”

“Yes, that’s how they move. And do you know that they lay eggs and that’s where baby worms come from? Look!”

One child held up two worms and ordered them by size.

“This one is the adult because it’s long and this one is the baby because it’s small. We need to rescue worms you know when they get dry like this, that’s not good for them.”

“I wonder how we could help them?”

“If you put them in water they get sticky again, that’s how they like to be.”



Autumn is here!

The children have been very observant about their world around them and how their environment is beginning to change. **“Autumn is coming, it’s getting cold and the leaves are falling down. They’re brown and orange and yellow and they’re all falling down.”** Phoebe **“I always see spotty leaves on the ground, it’s because they’ve died.”** Orla



Whilst outdoors, the children had noticed some apples growing on a tree. We picked them and brought them inside to investigate. The children worked hard to cut the apples open to reveal what was on the inside.

“Look this is a seed, it’s where apples come from!” Aspen

“The seed grows into a tree and then the tree grows apples and then you plant the seeds to grow more apples again.” Rosie

“Can we plant these Mrs Whelam-Tate?” Phoebe

Discussion quickly turned to looking after and caring for living things – we talked about what we would need to do to look after the seeds.

“We need to plant it in mud and water it.” Phoebe

“They need to go outside to grow because trees are big!” Isla

The girls continued to dig the seeds out of the apples, some were collected to plant and some were used to decorate ‘autumn pies’ that children had begun to make.

“I love to have pies when it’s cold outside.” Phoebe

“Yeah me too, my mam makes pies!” Aspen

Discussions quickly turned to ingredients, food preparations, sharing their home experiences of cooking - autumn pies quickly turned into a wider range of winter foods. Children used one handed tools such as peelers to remove the skin from fruit and vegetables that had been added to the provision as a provocation. The children were very excited to use real knives and boards to chop up their ingredients as they made a magnificent feast!



“I’ve made a pancake pie, it’s got apples and carrots inside. I need to cut it in half because it’s too big!” Aspen

“I’ve made a meal! Carrot and apple soup, fingers chips with carrots and seeds, and a stripy pie!” Rosie

“I’ve made a nice bowl of warm soup because it’s chilly outside. Soup makes you warm, I had some at a restaurant before!” Phoebe

“I’m making squirrel soup, I’ve used crispy leaves, apple peel and carrot peel and some powder that smells like nuts!” Orla

“I’ve made some orange carrots for you, there’s two on the bowl! There’s some orange flavour pancakes too, they’re orange flavour because their colour is orange.” Aspen

“My soup is carrot soup. It’s got carrot skins and carrot inside. I’m good at peeling carrots, I’m going to show mammy when I’m a big sister!” Isla

Munchkin pumpkins along with sketching pencils, chalk pastels and oil pastels have been this week's provocation in the new Atelier space. The children have loved developing their observational drawing skills, paying particular attention to *texture, shapes and pattern, colours and contours, shadows, light and shade, and perspective*

"I see pumpkins." Teddy

"They look like funny pumpkins." Phoebe

"They got stripes on." Phoebe

"They got green things on top of it." Hollie

"I see a tiny pumpkin what is all orange."

Rosie

"I see a orange pumpkin behind the green pumpkin." Teddy

"I'm going to use my finger to smudge the green in." Phoebe

Phoebe demonstrated her understanding of how to use the chalk pastels effectively to add detail and depth to her artwork.

"There's black at the bottom too." Teddy

Teddy noticed the pumpkin was casting a shadow making the bottom of the pumpkin appear black, which he then captured in his drawing.

"It's got stripes on it." Hollie

"It's got orange bits on the bottom. I'm just going to use a little bit of orange." Phoebe

"I'm putting lines on because this one has orange lines going down it, look." Hollie

"The stalk is like a rectangle." Phoebe

"The pumpkin is like a circle – it's all round." Hollie

The girls used their understanding of shape learned in last week's Maths meetings and applied it to their learning to create pictures.

Unfortunately, Maths Circle (the creators of NumBots) cannot provide username and password information to parents, even during school holidays or out of hours.
