The children looked at aerial views of our school, and were encouraged children to comment on what they notice, recognising buildings, open space, roads and other simple features. Baking has continued to be a common interest within the 'snug' this half term. The children have enjoyed exploring the internet and cook books to find a range of recipes that interested them.

Whilst reading through the cook book, Aspen noticed a picture of blueberry muffins.

The children then applied their phonetic knowledge and decoded the words, to find out the ingredients they needed. We came to the conclusion that we had all of the ingredients required and gathered them all together.
